Primary Sports Funding Spending 2018-19

The PE and sport premium is designed to help primary schools improve the quality of the PE and sport activities they offer their pupils.

This funding is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision of PE and sport in schools.

Eligible schools

Funding for schools will be calculated by reference to the number of primary-aged pupils (between the ages of 5 and 11), as recorded in the annual schools census in January. Schools with 17 or more eligible pupils receive £16,000 and an additional payment of £10 per pupil.

Purpose of funding

Schools must spend the additional funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this.

Possible uses for the funding might include:

- ☐ hiring specialist PE teachers or qualified sports coaches to work with primary teachers when teaching PE
- ☐ supporting and engaging the least active children through new or additional Change4Life clubs
- ☐ paying for professional development opportunities for teachers in PE and sport
- ☐ providing cover to release primary teachers for professional development in PE and sport
- ☐ running sport competitions, or increasing pupils' participation in the School Games
- ☐ buying quality assured professional development modules or materials for PE and sport
- ☐ providing places for pupils on after school sports clubs and holiday clubs
- ☐ pooling the additional funding with that of other local schools.

Accountability

From September 2013, schools will be held to account over how they spend their additional, ring-fenced funding. Ofsted will strengthen the coverage of PE and sport within the 'Inspectors' handbook' and supporting guidance so that both schools and inspectors know how sport and PE will be assessed in future as part of the school's overall provision.

One year on, Ofsted will carry out a survey reporting on the first year's expenditure of additional funding and its impact.

Schools will also be required to include details of their provision of PE and sport on their website, alongside details of their broader curriculum, so that parents can compare sports provision between schools, both within and beyond the school day.

| Lunch Time Games Providers | In order to support positive dinnertimes by making sure the children have the opportunity to engage in planned focused activities we have employed a number of staff to deploy these activities. The children are more engaged and as a result, less incidents of poor behaviour are recorded. It is also an opportunity for children to participate in more active activities as a focus for our school this year is to improve the health and fitness of all children. | £ 7,800 |
| Specialist Teacher | Over the last few years, our school has really benefitted from working with a specialist PE teacher. He brings a wealth of knowledge of a range of sports that our teachers may not feel confident in teaching. He works alongside them offering guidance on planning, differentiation for children with GT and SEN, formats for running lessons as well as supporting teachers with assessing the children and making sure, they are making progress. He runs both dinnertime and afterschool clubs giving the children even more opportunities to attend clubs. He is helping in the planning of competitions alongside other schools he works with giving the children the chance to compete in the absence of the school games calendar. | £ 1000 |
| SEMH Teacher | Our school has a high proportion of children who have attachment issues, experienced in some form domestic violence, looked after children, behavioural issues, children on Children in Need Plans and children with low confidence and self-esteem issues. Although class teachers deal with these issues as sensitively as possible we felt there was a real need to have someone who has a deeper understanding of these individual needs and who can offer proper therapeutic support within school. This teacher is able to offer 1:1 support to children and families as well as run parent groups for a range of issues. She is fully trained in a range of holistic therapies and a trained councillor. | £7,000 (additional costs funded through another budget) |
| Supply Costs + External Sporting event costs | This allows for staff who have been running clubs to take the experience further by attending intra schools competitions. This benefits the pupils in a number of positive ways. It allows children the experience of working and competing as a team. It allows the skills they have developed to be put to the test. The children also get the experience of losing or winning at a team event. Sometimes there are costs to enter competitions or possible transport costs. | £500 |
| Outdoor sports equipment | The school is planning to install permanent football goal posts /basket ball nets in our active area to help improve provision as existing cheaper equipment is not lasting. | £ 2090 RTSA also supporting cost |
